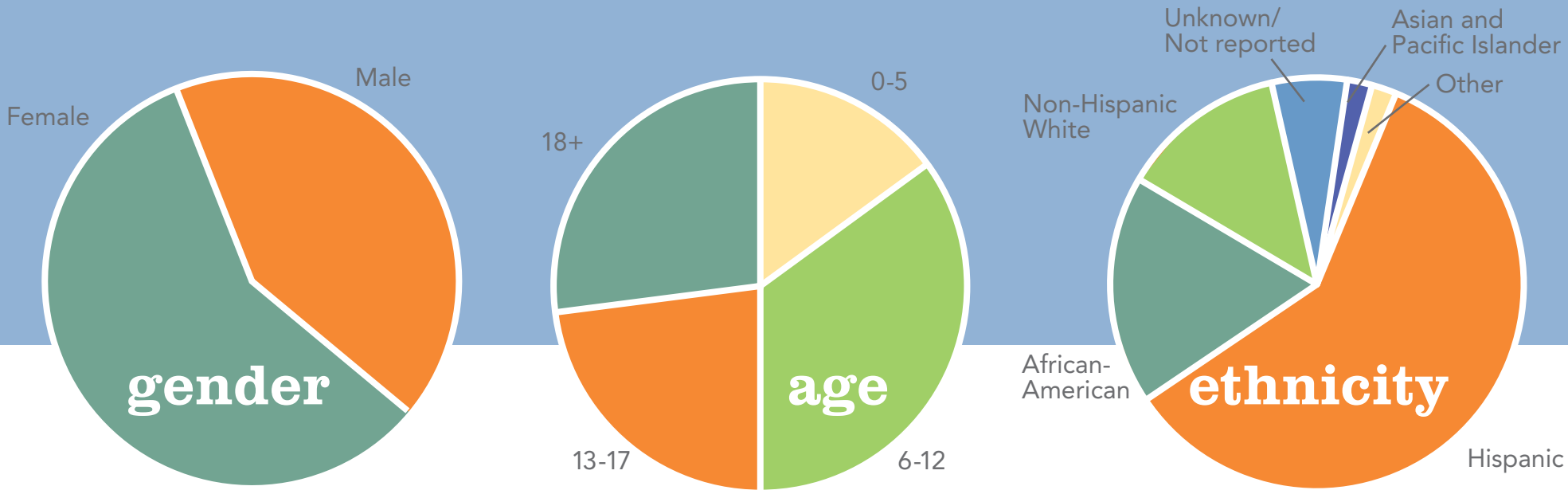

As Southern California grows and changes, so do the needs of its people. By tracking key statistics, Five Acres has a clear understanding of those we serve and vision to improve existing and future programs to help families remain together and thrive.

Who Uses Our Services?

The majority of those who receive Five Acres' services are between the ages of 6 and 12 years old. 58% are female, 42% are male and approximately 80% are people of color.

Length of Stay

On average, the length of time children stay in foster care with Five Acres is the shortest among all agencies in the United States.

Permanency

Five Acres increased its overall agency permanency rate to 83%, compared to the state rate of 30%, allowing more children to reunify or connect with forever families of their own.

"Since our family's first involvement with Five Acres twenty years ago, we've watched them creatively and innovatively adapt to the needs of its deserving clients. With an unwavering focus on positive lasting outcomes, Five Acres' strategic vision has positioned itself to serve even more clients while achieving even higher levels of permanency, well-being and safety. leading through community care

The Tuite Family



“Foster children are children, first and foremost. They deserve our loving care and attention,” said Colleen, who finalized the adoption of one of their daughters with Five Acres in 2017. “We chose to foster-adopt instead of other routes to adoption because it was important to us to help children in our local community.”

Colleen and Michael Tuite were no strangers to foster care and adoption when they first came to Five Acres. Having previously fostered and adopted in Virginia, they wanted to continue when they moved to California.

As Los Angeles transplants, the couple found piloting the city’s large and complex child welfare system a challenge. “Five Acres offers relevant training and tons of support throughout the process—it’s been great having them to help us navigate,” said Colleen. The Tuites also leaned on their fellow foster-adoptive community for support.

“I’ve always felt supported by my Five Acres social worker, but sometimes parent-to-parent contact can be helpful, too,” she said, remarking on her concern that as more children enter the system, the need for more foster families is critical. “That extra layer of support may help with retention and recruitment.”

The Tuites also recognized that caring for children in foster care is grounded in love and empathy—not in

perpetuating misconceptions about their situation. “Foster children enter the system through no fault of their own. Somewhere along the way, the people who were supposed to take care of them have failed them,” said Colleen. “You can make a huge difference in a child’s life just by being there for them day-by-day. You don’t have to be extraordinary to give a child a chance at an ordinary life.”

Now, as the Tuites prepare to adopt yet another child as part of their forever family, their message reaffirms Five Acres’ mission of strengthening families within their communities.

“Five Acres serves children in our community in a variety of capacities, and their staff is dedicated to the success of families,” said Colleen. “Strong families make strong communities.”

Former Five Acres client Jason Fleetwood entered the foster system at the age of five when he was found alone in a motel room. Without a permanent, loving family to connect with, his adolescence was rocky—and after two adoptive families fell through, his feelings of frustration and loneliness increased.

“I felt like no one wanted me or cared for me. I specifically remember telling some of the residential staff at Five Acres, ‘You don’t care about me, this is just a job for you,’” said Jason. “I really wanted to bring this up because I’m sure these are the current thoughts and emotions that other children in foster care are dealing with right now. But pretty much all of the staff at Five Acres loved what they did, and showed me unconditional love while I was there. Carol Lee, Dee Dee, Ann Garrett, Pat Murphy, Bill Shennum, Ronda, Chester, Paul Reno and many, many more. I wish I could let them all know how great they were at what they did.”

After Jason aged out of foster care, he battled against becoming a “statistic” of foster youth in Los Angeles. He struggled through homelessness and incarceration—but his life materially changed when his daughter was born.

“It took my daughter and an amazing wife to realize what true unconditional love is,” said Jason. “That’s when I understood—that the unconditional love I receive from my wife and daughter was the same love I got from my time at Five Acres.”

Now with a permanent family of his own, Jason chooses to give back to children at Five Acres who,

like him, both need and deserve of that kind of love. He regularly participates in Five Acres’ holiday toy drive, driving hundreds of miles every year to provide for children who are unable to be with families of their own during the season. Above all, continuing to raising awareness for their unseen social crisis is close his heart.

“I really hope more awareness is brought to kids growing up in the system. There is so much awareness for other organizations, and yet you very rarely see anything about orphans or foster kids at all,” said Jason. “I was strong enough and lucky enough to rise from it. Not everyone can do that. My wife and I are looking into fostering in the near future, and she’s even contemplating writing a biography about my story to bring more awareness to this nationwide problem.”

And while Jason was able to look back at his time at Five Acres to glean insight for his future role as husband and father, he recognizes that more children continue to need advocates both in and outside the foster care system in order to thrive.

“[That’s why] organizations like Five Acres are needed in the community,” said Jason. “We want to continue to help in any way possible.”



“Two years ago, I had a vision about introducing the power of poetry to the kids of Five Acres—and in 2017, I produced our first 5JammaSlamma event. International recording artists, renowned slam poets and a world champion beatboxer participated in this 7-day workshop and mentored kids living at Five Acres through their artistic journey. In February, 200 people gathered to celebrate our Five Acres poets and their beautiful words. As an event, 5JammaSlamma asks for no money from the friends who attend—only that we as a community stand as witness to the beauty our poets find in themselves.

This year, we’ve been given a generous grant by the Engaging the Senses Foundation to continue our work. What started as an offer to pay for our 5JammaSlamma party has now turned into a year-round commitment to fund the teaching of poetry to the kids living on campus at Five Acres—a brilliant gift that will continue to harvest beauty from the darkness. I can’t wait to see what happens next!”

Ways We Paved New Pathways to Permanency in 2016–2017

- Formed new partnerships with private healthcare providers in Southern California to serve an even greater number of kids and families
- Increased the number of bilingual clinicians on staff, giving our largest demographic access to critical services in their own language
- As the sole provider of community-based counseling to deaf individuals in L.A., we utilized social media to connect them with services tailored to their needs
- Gave back at family-focused community events to demonstrate the importance of parents spending time with their children
- Launched a web-based software specifically designed for the foster community, allowing us to spend less time on paperwork and more time achieving permanency
- Partnered with actor, director, producer and child advocate Matt Lillard to create 5JammaSlamma, a visionary workshop that empowers our foster youth to unleash their creativity
